As this challenging year was coming to a close, we came across an announcement about some very interesting research at the University of Waterloo on what is called the Canadian Index of Wellbeing (<a href="https://uwaterloo.ca/canadian-index-wellbeing/reports/2016-canadian-index-wellbeing-national-report">https://uwaterloo.ca/canadian-index-wellbeing/reports/2016-canadian-index-wellbeing-national-report</a>). Researchers are reporting that wellbeing is not increasing. Their findings are based on extensive consultations that produced a list of shared values which became a framework for the ongoing study. The report makes several interesting recommendations for policy makers that lead to choices that beget a better quality of life for Canadians.

It is an interesting parallel that fairness is really what CPBH's work is all about. Fairness is something we hold dear. We want it for ourselves and others.

# Manitoba: Concerns about the Delay in implementing the province's New Home Warranty

CPBH was pleased to be invited to participate by providing input for the development of Manitoba's New Home Warranty Act and regulations, scheduled to take effect on January 17, 2017. Implementation has now been delayed for a full year. Despite being assured this will be beneficial, we have yet to receive an answer about who will benefit from this action and how. We will continue to request an answer.



#### Ontario: Tarion Review

The holidays are almost upon us and we continue to await Justice Cunningham's report on the Tarion Review, while many new home owners are freezing in their newly built homes.

Early in 2016, we met with Justice Cunningham about the Tarion Review process to share our insights about consulting new home owners, as well as about what changes to the new home warranty and builder regulator regime could produce meaningful change for consumers in Ontario.

There were also several helpful meetings throughout 2016 at Queen's Park with MPPs, including one with new Ministry of Government and Consumer Services Minister, Marie-France Lalonde. We also spoke to Premier Wynne at a town hall meeting. We were encouraged by their engagement.

So much work took place in 2016 to lay the foundation for progress in 2017! We continue to believe that now is the time. Now is the time to keep needed changes before government and in the public

eye. Now is the time to make changes to builder regulation, new home warranties and dispute resolution processes.



# Tarion Review: CPBH Response to Justice Cunningham's Interim Report
